Curiosity & Initiative

• **Explore and ask questions** to seek meaningful information about a growing range of topics, ideas, and tasks.

Risk Taking

 Demonstrate a willingness to participate in new and challenging experiences.

Engagement & Attention

• Work toward **completing a task**, even if challenging, despite interruptions.

Persistence

• Attempt to **accomplish challenging tasks** by employing familiar and new strategies as needed.

<u>Memory</u>

• Retain and recall information presented over a short period of time.

Making Connections

• **Relate knowledge** learned from one experience to a similar experience in a new setting.

Resiliency

 Recognize that everyone makes mistakes and that using positive coping skills can result in learning from the experience.

Problem- Solving

• Attempt problem solving activities to achieve a positive outcome.

Social and Emotional Development

Speaking and Listening

- Participate in collaborative conversations with peers and adults.
- Answer questions about key details in a text or information presented orally.
- **Respond to what a speaker says** to follow directions, seek help, or gather information the first time it is stated.
- **Share** stories, familiar experiences, and interests
- Express thoughts, feelings, and ideas,
- Interact with peers and adults in a socially accepted manner. Share toys, games, and other learning materials.
- Ask for and accept offers of help when needed or appropriate.

Physical Development Motor Control

- Use pencils, crayons, markers, and glue **with control.**
- **Cut** with scissors along a straight and a curved line (with the thumb in top position).
- Write first name legibly using upper and lower case letters.
- Perform simple gross motor skills with ease (running, hopping, jumping).

Cognitive Development

- Identify at least 8 upper case and 8 lower case letters by name.
- Identify the **first sound** in a word.
- Identify rhymes.
- Identify familiar words and environmental print.
- Be able to identify the front and back of a book as well as understand how to turn the pages to keep reading.

Number Sense*

- Count to at least 20 quickly and accurately.
- **Read numbers** at least through 10 quickly.
- Count up to ten objects with 1-1 matching.
- **Compare** groups of objects.
- Understand addition as putting together and adding to and subtraction as taking apart and taking from.
- Identify, describe, and compare basic shapes.

*These cognitive skill benchmarks are **minimal competencies** for entering kindergarten.
